Please join us in a new venue for the annual summit of the West Virginia Chapter, American Academy of Pediatrics (WV AAP) in Canaan Valley. This two-day summit will provide the practitioner with information about relevant up-to-date topics in pediatrics. Registration includes course materials, CME credit, MOC Part II, lunch, break, reception and dinner on Friday, and breakfast and lunch on Saturday. 8. Describe the epidemiology, associated risk factors, treatment options, and harm reduction strategies for substance use disorders

2024 Summit Speakers



Patrick Bonasso, MD, MBA

Patrick C. Bonasso II, MD, is a pediatric general and thoracic surgeon and the pediatric trauma director at WVU Medicine Children's. Dr. Bonasso was born and raised in Fairmont, WV. He completed his medical degree and general surgery residency at WVU Medicine J.W. Ruby Memorial Hospital in Morgantown, WV, and completed his pediatric research fellowship and pediatric surgery fellowship at Arkansas Children's Hospital in Little Rock, AR.

His expertise includes anorectal disorders, laparoscopic inguinal hernias, extracorporeal membrane oxygenation (ECMO), tumors (lung, chest wall, gastrointestinal, germ cell, kidney, liver, neuroendocrine), necrotizing enterocolitis, neonatal congenital anomalies, pilonidal cysts, thyroglossal cysts, tracheoesophageal fistulas, diseases of small bowel and colon, Crohn's disease, ulcerative colitis, umbilical hernias, and Wilms tumors.

He is a member of the American Pediatric Surgical Association and the Pediatric Trauma Society.



Jesse Cottrell, MD

Dr. Amy Gavril is Division Chief of Child Safety and Advocacy, West Virginia University Medicine Children's Hospital and Associate Professor of Pediatrics at West Virginia University School of Medicine. She is dual board certified in pediatric medicine and child abuse pediatric medicine and specializes in child abuse pediatrics. Dr. Gavril is an active member of the American Academy of Pediatrics Council on Child Abuse and Neglect where she is busy writing and editing on the Policy Committee, and assisting in development of educational programs on the Education Committee. She has numerous publications on child maltreatment. She has extensive experience and training in the field of child physical abuse, child sexual abuse, child neglect, child fatalities, as well as pediatric and adolescent gynecology. Dr. Gavril serves as a medical consultant to various social services, medical, legal, and investigative agencies throughout West Virginia for cases of suspected child maltreatment, including medical-legal case reviews and expert testimony. Dr. Gavril comes to West Virginia after a 30 year US Navy career as a military physician.



Susan Kressly, MD

Dr. Susan Kressly has over 30 years of experience in general pediatric practice, over a decade in advancing pediatric health IT and has been involved in practice management and payment efforts to support pediatric practice since 2006. The first 15 years of her career Sue was a part of an independent group practice which was bought by a health system, then started her own practice in Bucks County, PA. Wanting to push the envelope and meet patient's needs in innovative ways, Sue was an early adopter of Health IT which led her to become an accidental clinical informaticist.

She was inducted into the West Virginia Healthcare Hall of Fame in 2023 for her work treating, teaching, and advocating for kids in our state.
